1. For each of the following sequences, calculate the first 4 terms (exactly, not a decimal approximation) and find the limit if it exists (exactly, not a decimal approximation) or write DNE if the limit does not exist.

a.  $a_n = \frac{1-n^2}{3n^2-2}$

$$\lim_{x \rightarrow \infty} \frac{1-n^2}{3n^2-2} = \lim_{x \rightarrow \infty} \frac{\frac{1}{n^2}-1}{3-\frac{2}{n^2}} = \frac{0-1}{3-0} = -\frac{1}{3}$$

$n$	1	2	3	4	$\infty$
$a_n$	0	$-\frac{3}{10}$	$-\frac{8}{25}$	$-\frac{15}{46}$	$-\frac{1}{3}$

b.  $b_n = (-1)^n \left(\frac{1}{2}\right)^n$

$$\left|(-1)^n \left(\frac{1}{2}\right)^n\right| \leq \left(\frac{1}{2}\right)^n \Rightarrow \lim_{x \rightarrow \infty} (-1)^n \left(\frac{1}{2}\right)^n = \lim_{x \rightarrow \infty} \left(\frac{1}{2}\right)^n = 0$$

$n$	1	2	3	4	$\infty$
$b_n$	$-\frac{1}{2}$	$\frac{1}{4}$	$-\frac{1}{8}$	$\frac{1}{16}$	0

c.  $c_n = \sqrt{\frac{2n}{n+1}}$

$$\lim_{x \rightarrow \infty} \sqrt{\frac{2n}{n+1}} = \sqrt{\lim_{x \rightarrow \infty} \frac{2n}{n+1}} = \sqrt{\lim_{x \rightarrow \infty} \frac{2}{1+\frac{1}{n}}} = \sqrt{\frac{2}{1+0}} = \sqrt{2}$$

$n$	1	2	3	4	$\infty$
$c_n$	$\sqrt{\frac{2}{2}} = 1$	$\sqrt{\frac{4}{3}} = \frac{2\sqrt{3}}{3}$	$\sqrt{\frac{6}{4}} = \frac{\sqrt{6}}{2}$	$\sqrt{\frac{8}{5}} = \frac{2\sqrt{10}}{5}$	$\sqrt{2}$
